ALPHA STUDIO + BETA LAB

This month I am excited to talk in detail about our two new workspaces at QUT Kelvin Grove; Alpha Studio and Beta Lab. We moved into these new rooms late March, just before the launch and announcement event of the M8 Competition Coupé.

Alpha Studio

The Alpha Studio is our design and education workspace. Formerly the Academy office we had in D401 at Gardens Point campus, the Alpha Studio in Z2-308 is much the same in terms of set-up and purpose. Our team of Design Associates are based here and work on the Special Projects program, while our interns work here each semester completing their Work Integrated Learning units and unique design projects.

In this space we have workstations with high-end PCs, a presentation and meeting space, plus plenty of floor space for walking around and testing in Virtual Reality. Some minor renovations are currently underway to freshen up the space, and once complete will allow us to install some signage, whiteboards, a large display screen, and plenty of posters and displays showing off past intern projects. We will share some images of the room when it is all completed.







Beta Lab

The Beta Lab in Z2-407 is our 'hero' space. Positioned in what is better known within QUT as The Glasshouse, we are overlooking the Parer Place courtyard at the southern end of the Kelvin Grove campus. The Beta Lab is easily identifiable by our signage, particularly the bold red line that runs around the exterior glazing of the room. We refer to the Beta Lab as an advanced research and teaching workspace; it is where our Research Associates conduct their project work and will also host a number of school and studio group tours, presentations and events, plus workshops and activities.

This room was extensively renovated in the few months leading up to our March launch event for the M8 Competition. We were actively involved in the design and decision-making of the room, ensuring that the room was presented in a way that reflects the Academy and does justice to the car, in addition to having flexibility to cater for a variety of projects, visits and workshops. In future we will add some more branding to the interior, plus implement a number of physical and digital (AR) presentation and display pieces. In the coming weeks we will start our public opening hours, allowing students, staff and other guests to come and see the Beta Lab space, the M8 Competition and learn about the Academy. Opening hours will be during select hours each week.

The expansion to two new (and big) spaces at QUT is a positive sign of the investment and support that we have from both QUT and BMW Group. If you are ever on campus at Kelvin Grove, come and say hi!



EXTERNAL COLLABORATIONS

Following Easter weekend we hosted Levi Swann's DNB215 Personal Transportation unit at our Beta Lab space. Brisbane BMW were also present with the iX and iX3 models. Students were able to hear from Brisbane BMW Product Experts about the technology and features of the iX and iX3 vehicles, then interact with the cars, in addition to checking out the M8 Competition at the Academy. Students were there to analyse and understand the various technology and features of the vehicles, looking specifically into human-machine interactions. They will consider how they can apply technology and interactions to future micro-mobility concepts. The cars were also a perfect opportunity to explore the ergonomics and other critical user experience elements and features of the different BMW models. This was the first of many studio groups and sessions we will host for design students at QUT. We cannot wait for more of these in the future!















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
